

## General Tips for 9<sup>th</sup>-11<sup>th</sup> Graders

- What are your goals?
- Begin doing your research on college and career options through Naviance
- Keep your grades up. GPA is important regardless of your plan!
  - Grades, GPA, and attendance goes on your official transcript
  - Final grades of C's or lower keep your GPA the same or make it lower!
- Are you challenging yourself academically?
- Should I re-take any classes in summer school?
- Start building a strong resume
  - Sports, work, extra-curricular activities
  - Leadership





### 2-YEAR COLLEGE



All students interested in attending NOVA are encouraged to apply through the <u>Pathway Program</u>.



- Open to <u>all seniors</u>
- There is <u>no minimum GPA</u>, but "strong consideration" given to:

Barriers to college access	Recent grades
Attendance	Future goals

 2-year program at NOVA that helps you with your transition to college and guaranteed admissions to a 4-year school

<u>Applications are available October of senior year and due the first week of November</u>

## Important Factors that College Admissions Officers Want to See

- ☐ Transcripts (Grades/overall GPA)
- ☐ Strength of high school courses
- ☐ Admissions test scores (ACT/SAT)
- ☐ Essay
- ☐ Student's demonstrated interest
- ☐ Personal accomplishments
  - Resume (extracurricular activities, club/sports, jobs)
  - Leadership
  - Letters of recommendations
- ☐ Courses in progress senior year



### **College Admission Tests**





#### **ACT**

- Consists of 4 tests: English, Math, Reading, Science
- Writing component is optional
- Top composite score is 36



#### **SAT**

- Consists of <u>2 tests: Verbal & Math</u>
- Writing component is optional
- Each test is scored on a scale of 200-800 (1600)
- FREE Practice through Khan Academy



#### **TOEFL**

- Test for non native English speakers
- Talk to your counselor if you think you need to take this exam

#### What is important to you?

- Prestige
- Location
- Academics/Major
- Size
- Campus Appeal
- Social Life
- Total Cost



#### **Quick Pointers**

- Does it make sense for me to go to a 4-year school?
- A "good" college varies from student to student
- Do your research!
  - Admission requirements
  - Majors, programs, internships
  - Cost
- Be realistic!
  - Safety school
  - Match school
  - Reach school



- Most students apply to 5-8 colleges No more than 10 schools!
- It's okay to not know what you want to major in! Most schools do not make you declare a major until the end of your 2<sup>nd</sup> year consider "undeclared" or Liberal Arts options
- Consider visiting/taking a college tours




#### Scholarships & Financial Aid

Merit-Based Scholarships	Need-Based Scholarships
Based on grades/GPA, test scores, academic and athletic accomplishments, leadership, school involvement	Based on family income or ability to pay

- Awarded by the college or outside organizations
- There are MILLIONS of \$\$\$\$ out there!
- Information and applications are sent out to seniors via e-mail by Mr. Clisham (Naviance)
- Check college websites for specific awards
- Many scholarships may require:
  - Student Essay
  - Official Transcript
  - Letter of Recommendation
  - FAFSA/Income Information
- FAFSA Application Opens Oct. 1<sup>st</sup>
