

Do your research on college and career options

- College campus visits
- College rep visits in Town Hall
- Virtual tours/presentations/seminars


Keep your grades up through June 12th! • This is your last full year to raise your GPA

- How am I preparing for applying to college in the fall?
 Familiarize yourself with the WHS College Planning Checklist
 Plan 4 weeks ahead! Applying to college is like taking an extra course in 12th grade
 - How am I going to organize my time/deadlines?

How Do I Decide What Path is Right for Me?

Take time to reflect:

- Where do you see yourself in 5 years? 10 years?
- Am I academically/socially-emotionally ready for college-level work and being more independent?
- Have I had honest/realistic conversations with parents?
 - Financial expectations
 - Location
 - Preparedness
 - Maturity
- Have I weighed out the pros/cons of 2-year college versus a 4-year college?



- Open to <u>all seniors</u>
- There is no minimum GPA to attend.
- SAT tests/GPA's are used to determine placement



- 3.0 GPA-can place directly into college level
- 2.0-2.99 GPA- college plus remedial classes
- Less than 2.o-remedial classes required before college level
- Guaranteed Admissions Agreements to transfer to a 4-year college for those who qualify
- Students are encouraged to take DE classes in 12th grade
- Meetings with NOVA Counselor begin in the fall

Benefits:

- Additional time to grow/mature/improve my academic skills
- Additional time to figure out career track/major
- Save money!

2 - 3 Year Associates of Applied Science and Certificate Programs

If you are not certain about going to a 4-year college, these are some examples of 2-3 year-long programs that will give you the training, experience and skills needed in a specific profession. These degrees and certificates boost your employability in these career fields.

- Application (online)
- Application fee
- Official high school transcript
- Essay

Optional:

- Official SAT or ACT scores
- Letter of Recommendation

- 1,500 students
- On-campus apartment-style housing (must keep a 2.5 GPA)
- Students have the option to transfer to William & Mary or any other 4-year college in Virginia
- Rolling admissions
- Average GPA: 2.5
- Approximately \$18,269/year

Quick Pointers

- Does it make sense for me to go to a 4-year school?
- Do your research!
 - Admission requirements
 - Average GPA/SAT scores
 - Majors, programs, internships
 - Cost
- Be realistic!
 - Safety school
 - Match school
 - Reach school



- Most WHS students apply to 6-10 colleges This is NOT a competition!
- Consider visiting/taking a college tour for all schools you will apply to
- Get in the habit of checking your email every day. Communication (especially with your counselor) is <u>very</u> important.
- Familiarize yourself with the <u>WHS College Planning Checklist</u>

<u>Admissions Deadlines - Options</u>

Early Decision	 Binding (legal contract) You can only apply to ONE Early Decision school Admission is granted usually by December 1st 	
Early Action	 Non-binding You can apply to multiple schools Admission is granted usually before winter break 	
Regular Decision	 Non-binding You can apply to multiple schools Typically in January/February Admission is granted by April 1st 	
Rolling Admissions	 You can apply whenever you want Admission is granted on a first-come, first-serve basis so you can apply early for an early notification 	

What information do college admission officers review?

- Transcripts (Grades/overall GPA)
- Strength of high school courses
- Admissions test scores (ACT/SAT)"Test-Optional"
- Essay- a big part of your application
- Student's demonstrated interest
- Personal accomplishments
 - Resume (extracurricular activities, club/sports, jobs)
 - Leadership
 - Letters of recommendation
- Courses in progress senior year & mid-year reports

Components of Your Application

Component	Who Is Responsible for Sending?	How?	
College Application (Essay, resume, etc.)	Student	Online through admissions websites, Common App. or Coalition App.	
*SAT/ACT Test Scores	Student	Student submits request through College Board or ACT	
Teacher Letter of Rec.	Teacher/ Counselor	 Student ask teacher in person <u>first</u> Submit official request in Naviance (Plan 4 weeks in advance) 	
Official Transcript	Counselor	 Transcript Request Form (Available in the fall) Once submitted, Counselor sends the following items through Naviance: Official Transcript School Profile Secondary School Report Teacher Letter of Rec. (if requested) Counselor Letter of Rec. (if requested) 	

College Admission Tests

Note: Before you take one, find out if the schools you are applying to are "test-optional"







Consists of four tests: English,
Math, Reading, Science
Writing component is optional
Top composite score is 36



CollegeBoard

SAT

Consists of two tests: Verbal & Math Each section is scored 200-800 Perfect score is 1600

TOEFL

Test for non-native English speakers

Talk to your counselor if you think you need to take this exam

Reading, Listening, Speaking and Writing

Each section has a score range of 0-30

What Should I Be Doing Now?



By the End of June of 11th Grade

- Make sure you meet with your counselor before the summer
- Register/take the SAT or ACT (if applicable)
- Make sure you update your email in Naviance
- Identify and talk to at least 2 teachers to request a letter of recommendation
- Begin compiling a list of your accomplishments/resume
- Check your emails and Follow WHS College Planning Checklist

Checklist Items

- Research colleges
- Review SAT/ACT Scores
- Add 3-5 schools to your "Colleges I'm Applying To" List
- After August 1st, create your Common App account using the exact name and email that is listed in Naviance:
- Begin your college applications
- If you need a counselor letter of recommendation, please let your counselor know at least <u>4 weeks</u> before your deadline.

What Should I Do in the Fall?

Suggested Timeline	Checklist Item
August/ September 2024	 Finalize your list of 6-10 schools that you are applying to Register/take your 1st or 2nd attempt SAT or ACT (if applicable) Complete the <u>FERPA Waiver</u> in your Common App Complete the <u>Common Application Match</u> in Naviance- Submit official requests for teacher letters of recommendation - Naviance Continue working on college applications
October 2024	 Begin sending SAT/ACT scores to your colleges Begin your FAFSA Application- Availability is unknown at this time for Class of 2025 (fafsa.ed.gov) Follow up with/thank your 1-2 teachers who are writing your letters of recommendation Meet with your counselor to check-in and discuss application progress Fill out a Transcript Request Form (1 FOR EACH SCHOOL) This will be a Google Form link shared with you in the fall

Tips for Parents/Guardians

- Counselors are currently meeting with their Juniors to discuss their post-secondary plans.
- Encourage independence!
- Help your child be realistic about their options.
- If applying to a 4-year college, help your child stay organized!
- Plan 4 weeks in advance!
- We don't recommend applying to more than 10 schools
- Encourage as much research as possible!
- College campus visits
- College rep visits in Town Hall come Fall 2024
- Virtual tours/presentations/seminars/panels

IMPORTANT REMINDERS

- Please check your email daily!
 Look out for emails regarding college rep visits, scholarships, and other important notifications.
- Do your research on your schools!
 Visit each school if possible.
- •**Be realistic** with your schools (safety, match, and reach schools).
- •Plan <u>4 weeks</u> ahead! Teachers and counselors have approximately 50-60 other seniors requesting letters of recommendations/transcripts.
